Background

Attempting to go out of business!

What does MJFF do?

- + Leading Parkinson's disease funder, established in 2000.
- + Funded more than \$2.5bn to date, more than \$450m in 2025.
- + OA policy in place since 2020, including coverage of APC fees.

What do I do?

- + At MJFF since 2019, with an array of roles.
- + Building initiatives on training and engaging researchers.
- + Developing, implementing, and iterating new OS policy.

Why expand open science initiatives?

Increase research impact, integrity, and engagement.

- + To drive clearer disease definition, faster therapeutic development by making high quality, easily usable research outputs **more widely accessible** and available to improve the lives of PwPD.
- + To provide researchers with a head start, so they can accelerate field-wide research, further de-risking subsequent investments in PD research & **increase engagement** between colleagues.
- + To bolster our impact as an enabler of scientific advancement and better equip the **next generation of PD researchers**.

What questions do we have?

- + Why do people care about prestige?
- + Who or what gets to confer it?
- + Can we re-assess our answers that better serves our constituents?

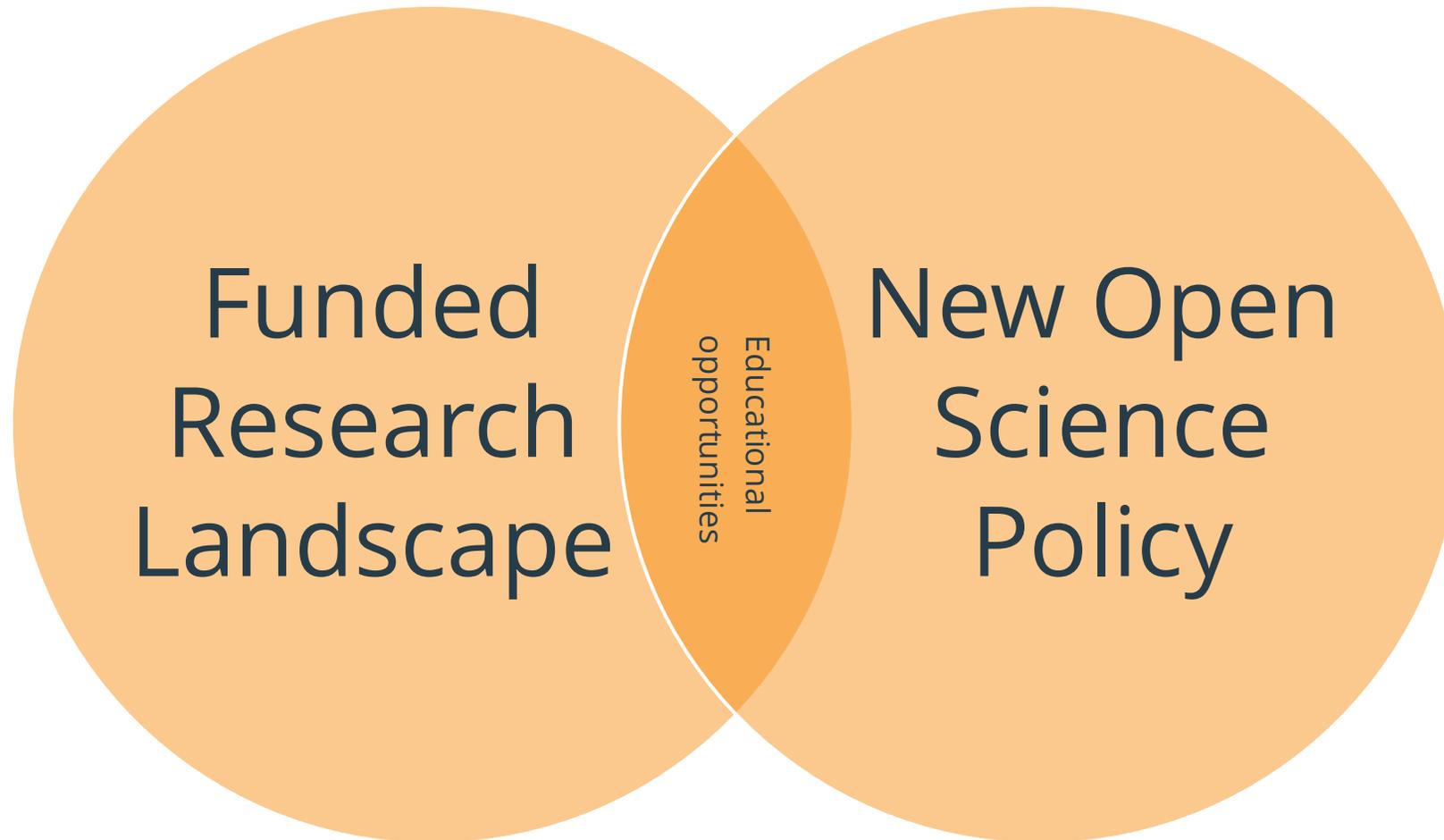


Why do our researchers care?

Openness and dissonance.

- + Enjoy being able to benefit from open, preexisting tools that are made available to them free of charge (tools, models, cell lines, samples, data, code).
- + Appreciation of the conceptual underpinning around open science but live in the real world and publishing in high-impact journals is still king.

Where does opportunity lie?



What are our current policies?

Fewer requirements, less enforcement, harder to track.

- + MJFF awardees required to use open licenses for publications, deposit code/data in accessible repositories, and share in preprint servers.
- + Research outputs have been historically hard to track in a systematic/automated manner under current policies.
- + Probably doesn't confer prestige because it is limited and simply an administrative requirement.

What is the current & future state?

Broadening our definition of openness from OA to OS.

Items	Policy	Change
Article Licensing, ORCID, Funder Acknowledgement	Required	Clarification
Data, Preprints	Required	Retain
Code/Software, Data/Code Availability Statement	Required	New
Materials, Pre-Registration, Protocols, RRIDs	Encouraged	New

What does this mean?

Trying to move the needle on perceptions of prestige.

- + Realistic about role publishing in peer-review journals plays in ongoing employment considerations.
- + Want to elevate value placed on other research contributions beyond articles and incorporate that into our grantmaking/review process.
- + Institute policies for better capturing and showcasing research outputs because it has historically favored articles because they are high visibility.
- + Include financial support to support high degree of uptake and compliance, because funding is often the end goal and we can provide that.
